# 'Huge leap' in fight to save day centre

PROFESSIONAL day care services for older people could soon be returning to Honiton, after community leaders celebrated a "huge leap forward" in their bid to save the St Michael's day centre.

Dedicated volunteers fighting to secure the building's future have now struck a deal with county council chiefs to provide day care services at the building for three-and-a-half days a week.

They will now seek to establish a community interest company to help them raise enough money to get the project off the ground later this year.

A small group of volunteers came together soon after Devon County Council announced it would no longer be able to cover the cost of day services for older people at St Michael's.

Under a new name – provisionally the 'Honiton 55+ Centre' – the group hopes to recruit two paid members of staff to work alongside an army of volunteers in restoring regular day care services at the building.

The group plans to provide clients with the option of full or half-day visits, with a regular lunch club and coffee mornings also in the pipeline.

Around £6,000 has already been contributed to help kick-start the project, and those leading the scheme say they are confident of raising the money required.

Jackie Wadsworth, whose elderly mother is a former user of the St Michael's day centre, began the project last year and is now being supported by a team of volunteers.

"The idea was first raised at Christmas, when my mother was upset about having to say goodbye to the many friends she had made at St Michael's," she said.

"The first six months is going to be very hard graft for whoever is involved, but we will start slowly and gradually build things up."

John Zarczynski, who was appointed the group's chairman at a meeting last week, said: "We have had promises of substantial donations and will be able to

apply for grants from a long list of sources. So we feel we will have enough money to make the commitment as far as staffing is concerned.

"But the important thing is that we have had the offer from the council – we have made a huge leap forward by securing the three-and-a-half days.

"There will be many more hurdles to clear but we have jumped the first one."

As well as providing a service for former clients of St Michael's, Mr Zarczynski said the group wants to extend the building to anyone over the age of 55.

They also want to expand the scope of the service over time, with a long-term vision to provide a benefits clinic and treatment room at the centre.

Mr Zarczynski added: "It sounds like a great deal for us to organise, but it's something we will be working on and expanding as we go along."

"If we do not lay the foundations now we cannot expect these things to happen in the future."

Devon County Council announced last year that it would be withdrawing its funding for day centres, as part of a programme of cost-cutting measures.

Alternative day care provision has since been arranged for many of the centre's former users.

But Mr Zarczynski said there are "many people

who have been reallocated against their wishes and scattered across the area".

"Some of them will miss their friends and their surroundings. We will give them the chance to come back," he said.

Neil Hurlock, from the TRIP Community Transport Association, has also stepped in to manage the finances.

Mr Hurlock said a substantial donation had already been made towards the project, with some of the money to be used to set up the company and produce a business plan.

And the group is already looking ahead to August, by which time they hope to have the service up and running.

### SEATON

### Council meet residents over parking issues

**CAMPAIGNERS** behind an 80-strong petition against new parking restrictions won a partial victory when Devon County Council (DCC) agreed to meet them and put their concern on the agenda.

There is no guarantee that the double yellow lines they oppose will be removed but DCC has agreed to meet the residents of Seaton Down Road who object to the yellow lines down a section of the road between Ryall's Court and Cherry Drive.

They claimed to have been "appalled" at the beginning of October to find that parking restrictions had been put in place without warning. DCC denies to have acted without warning, but has agreed to review the matter.

### AXMINSTER

### Police clampdown on anti-social behaviour

**AXMINSTER** police are targeting anti-social youths to stamp out increasing instances of anti-social behaviour.

Police Sergeant Jim Humphrey (Neighbourhood Team Leader Honiton & Axminster) has revealed to *Pulman's View* that a strategy was put in place after "a very small number of youths" caused "a disproportionate amount of anti-social behaviour".

Those attending Axminster Town Council on Monday, April 13th heard members of the public tell about youths harassing elderly residents in Willhayes Park by knocking on doors and tapping on windows.

Patrols have been increased, and police have a Plan B in case one is needed.

## COLYTON & COLYFORD Council agrees to take on the town library

**COLYTON** Parish Council has agreed in principle to take on ownership of the town's library after it was chosen as one of 12 across the county to pilot a community-led scheme.

Following public consultation after it was announced that Devon County Council had to cut its library budget £1.5million over the next four years, Colyton was named as one of 12 libraries across the county to pilot a scheme which would see the local community taking greater responsibility in running the facility.

Devon County Council is working with community groups in the 12 towns to help shape the new organisation and try new ways of involving local people so they can have more say on how their library is run. In Colyton, the council has been working with the Friends of Colyton Library.

Having attended a meeting with the Friends, parish councillor Sheila Smith reported back to the council last week, asking if they would consider taking ownership of the building.

Jane Dauncey of the Friends of Colyton Library said: "We are very pleased the parish council has agreed in principle to take on the building and we look forward to working with them closely in the future.

"This is a major step towards achieving our goal of a secure community library for Colyton."
