Whilst Oil Mill Lane Residents Association (OMLRA) support East Devon District Council in their REFUSAL of this application and in defending the appeal OMLRA raise a number of further serious concerns and objections which can be summarised as follows:-

- The unjustified loss of best and most versatile (Grade 3a) land (as well as Grade 2)
- · Harm to heritage assets, individually and cumulatively
- Landscape harm
- Harm to local tourism based businesses
- A failure to consider cumulative impacts of this and other significant and extensive developments in the immediate vicinity.

The Appeal is made by Solstice Renewables Ltd. against the decision of East Devon District Council (EDDC) to **REJECT** the application. This is the **ORIGINAL** application for the largest site covering some 48 acres of High Quality Agricultural land (Grades 2 and 3a). The subsequent application for a reduced scale site has been temporarily held in abeyance by EDDC in the light of the most recent Ministerial Statements requiring "the most compelling evidence" for Planners to recommend a solar development on high grade farmland.
